AstroCon 2025 By Rick Heschmeyer

This year, AstroCon was held in Bryce Canyon City, Utah near the entrance to Bryce Canyon National Park. The conference ran from Wednesday June 25 through Saturday June 28, with the Astronomical League Council Meeting taking place on Tuesday, the 24, prior to the start of AstroCon. Nearby, the France Canyon Fire was active and only 20% contained throughout the event. At its closest point the fire came within 6 miles of the park. Depending upon the wind direction, the smoke level varied from moderate to very unhealthy. One day we found ash on our cars as we exited the program, but in the evening the smoke tended to settle into the valleys to give everyone a hint of the dark night skies in and around the park. I can only imagine how truly dark the sky must be when there is not a fire nearby.

The overarching theme of the conference was imaging, with about 2/3 of the presentations and workshops were related to imaging in one way or another. Additionally, each night there were Astrophotography/Digital Imaging sessions not too far from the conference location, Ruby's Inn, and private star parties for AstroCon attendees at Rainbow's Point, inside Bryce Canyon National Park, where more imaging was taking place. The private star party for the first evening of the conference was cancelled due to smoke. The winners of the Astrophotography Contest were announced at the Gala Banquet on Saturday evening. A Visual Observing Contest was also held during the conference with awards given out Saturday night.

There were about 15 vendors set up in the Exhibitor Hall displaying their services and gear. Special shoutouts go to the Salt Lake City Astronomical Society and the Utah Valley Astronomy Club, as well as the 2025 AstroCon Committee, for planning and hosting the event. Despite the challenges of nearby fire, smoke, and rolling power outages due to the fires, the event was very informative and fun.

The conference wrapped up on Saturday night with the Gala Banquet at Ebezener's Barn & Grill with a live concert by The Bryce Canyon Wranglers, followed by dinner and awards.

Bryce Canyon Astronomy Festival 2025 (There was smoke from the fires to contend with)

Coinciding with, but separate from, AstroCon 2025, Bryce Canyon National Park held their annual Astronomy Festival from June 26-28. I, along with several other AstroCon 2025 attendees, participated in the evening telescope observing that was open to the public.

The star party took place from 10PM until midnight each night. Even with the nearby France Canyon Fire, the smoke subsided enough for the telescope field to be open all three nights. Nearly 2000 people visited the dozens of telescopes on the field during the festival.

THE WEATHER DIDN'T DAMPEN THE CONVENTION





WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

Sunday morning, Peggy Walker the S.T.E.A.M. and Accessible Astronomy Coordinator and Chair Rick Heschmeyer kicked off the day with the answer to the question, Where do we go from here? Answer: We engage the youth in the region.

Peggy opened the session with the history of the Youth League established in 1947, along with the Adult League and how successful it was. She talked about the Youth ALCon she put together for Alburquerque with partnerships from Rob Teeter of Teeter Telescopes, Celestron, eScope Optics and Sidewalk Astronomers to build telescopes for families. Peggy stated it was not allowed to move forward and was concelled. She stated that she was confused by that since she was brought on board the National Council to do that very thing in 2017.

She tied that into her being put in charge of a committee at ALCon Business Meeting last year that consisted of all the regional officers to generate

a status on each region and their personal effort for their future. She sent out a confidential questionnaire, and the main comment was, "We don't need regions". With this mind-set out there, it became paramount to celebrate the Mid-States 75th Anniversary and celebrate all the volunteers and clubs, just in case the region were to disappear.

The Regional Officers had already determined they were not going to let the region go quietly into the night. In fact, since Rick Heschmeyer became the Regional Chair, their plan to reboot MSRAL with a youth coordinator, who would help rally regional youth to help plan, participate in and speak at the annual conventions. This talk was to be the kick off to the concept and plan to accomplish this feat. Chair Heschmeyer started off but was rabbit trailed by comments and the plan never was able to be shared. Prior to the session, Peggy was asked to document every comment, statement, question and concern that was voiced to make sure the officers would review all things mentioned, as they moved forward.

Some points expressed were, What do you do with students in the summer when not at school? Are there funds to allow them time on some of the many remote telescopes? Volunteers in clubs is at an all time low, and that includes parents of the students. Clubs do not offer a very welcoming atmosphere or are to stodgy and old. Current family culture is to drop students off and not be engaged with them in their pursuit of astronomy. What are the potential legalities involved in that with the national issues regarding young people? How can elementary students be included in this endeavor? And the iPhone, gaming distractions only demonstrates a youth's 3 second scroll mentality. Peggy mentioned how she has a list of all the regional observatories and wants to network them and run projects from them.

The back and forth continued until a young man entered the room. Peggy had talked to him on Friday at the registration desk and said we would love to see you at the Sunday morning talk. She saw that the current dialog was in a loop so she walked over to him and asked if he would be open to have us talk to him and ask him questions. He said Yes.

Peggy introduced Keenan Latin a member of CAAS to the podium to get first hand, current culture information to paint the picture of where the youth mind set is these days. He stated he was an imager who often goes go on-line to get answers to his questions or problems. He did confirm the 3 minute scroll mentality of his peers. Keenan said, "They are not curious about anything. You have to bring the curiosity to them." Had to get back on schedule and he was thanked for his valuable input and Rick returned to the podium. The session closed and the schedule went on and Peggy told Rick that she had 4 1/2 pages of notes for the officers to review and would get them typed and to the officers ASAP. Several attendees told Peggy that was the most genius maneuver they had ever seen and added it was very pertinent. Good Job.

So stay tuned for the plans and ideas that are being worked on. Regional Council Zoom Meetings will be scheduled so make sure your club president is in attendance and that they are passing down the information to all of you members. REGIONAL BYLAW RATIFICATION

MSRAL Bylaw updates per Art. VII Sec 4. states there needs to be a Regional Council meeting prior to ratification. That Regional Council Meeting was convened at the end of September. It further states that the Regional Council has 45 days to review all amendment changes with their clubs before ratification. Art. VII, Sec 3 Proposal allows 45 days for any changes, comments that would be addressed by the clubs even as late as (10) days prior to the annual meeting. Only two clubs responded that they reviewed the Bylaws and had no recommendations for any changes. At the ratification part of the MSRAL Business Meeting, there is no allowance for discussion on any changes since the clubs were given from late to September to November 4th to have that discussion. Ratification at the Business Meeting makes the changes official. Please contact club officers if you were not made aware of these changes last fall. The changes are:

Art II: Sec 2. b. was reworded to list the regional hierarchy of officers.

C. was added: only elected Executive Officers can conduct business at any meeting.

PASSED

Purpose: National Bylaws amendment changes.

Art II: Sec 3. added The Mid-States Region of the Astronomical League subscribes to the official Conflict of Interest Policy of the Astronomical League.

PASSED

Purpose: National Bylaws amendment changes.

Art II: Sec 8. 2. Regional Chair was reworded "Acts as CEO"

Purpose: was in original bylaws was accidentally emitted during major revision process two years ago.

Art II: Sec 8. 10. Regional Chair, Sec 8. b 4 Regional Vice Chair, and Sec 8. d 10 Regional Representative all sign student national award candidate submission forms. **PASSED**

Purpose: Is required on all submission forms for additional youth awards —needed to be added since region is pursuing rallying the regional youth.

Art II: Sec 9. b. Any changes in elected officer position should be communicated to the member clubs within 30 days. **PASSED**

Purpose: To keep region up to date on officers.

Art VI: Sec 3 was Tentative: The National treasurer will be added to the bank account and must receive monthly statements as well as year-end balance statements. **RECENDED**

Purpose: National Bylaws amendment changes does not line up with current bank regulations and became difficult to find a bank that would comply to this policy.

Art VI: Sec 4 Personal Finances was reworded to be more specific. No personal finances are to be used for regional endeavors or projects without Regional Council approval and renumeration appropriately spelled out. Thorough minutes must accompany all decisions. **PASSED**

Purpose: previously stated said no "comingling" of funds, but better clarification needed to be spelled out due to National Bylaws amendment changes. Bylaws amendment changes.

Art VI: Sec 9 phrase added at end "and must be brought to the regional council for discussion, vote and adoption. **PASSED**

Purpose: provided clarification of new project topic discussed at previous conventions.

Standing Resolution #3 Repealed due to the dissolution of the IDA.

From here, the Bylaws will have the changes made and the date of revision added and will be posted on the MSRAL.org site and put in the MSRAL.IO Group files. If you currently are / not in that discussion group, please join the many conversations that take place in there.



CELEBRATING TOGETHER UNDER THE STARS FOR 75 YEARS AND COUNTING

The Astronomical League had early roots back to the 1939 Cushing, New York World's Fair, and was officially formalized after the second World War on August 30, 1947. The Mid-States Region formed in 1949 and became official in 1950 and joined the League in 1951.

The Central Missouri Amateur Astronomers met in Fayette, MO, at the Morrison Observatory of Central College under the leadership of Dr. Floyd Helton, Gene Waters and Russell Maag. Some of the names and faces have changed, but the goal is still the same - to come together and share ideas, resources, and encouragement in this hobby of astronomy. Currently, the Mid-States Region contains many members who joined as a young adult and have recounted their great enduring relationships that they still enjoy today.

This year's 75th Anniversary was held at the University of AR at Little Rock, AR on June 13th to 15th, 2025 and was hosted by Central Arkansas Astronomical Society. This is the first convention in 22-years where there was a full complement of officers and convention chair working together, exactly how the region was established as reported in Sky & Telescope articles and convention archive minutes.

The major hurdle facing the convention process is the ever increasing on-line meetings culture VS hosting in-person meetings and conventions. Although there is a place for that, MSRAL officers still value the coming together like a family reunion every June. The best part is, a new officer position, Regional Youth Coordinator will be in charge of a team of youth who will plan their convention.

One thing we know for sure, is that according to Archives on Youth Activities, the Astronomical



League had a successful model back at its inception in 1947, where a student league of youth astronomy clubs were connected nationally through, a snail mail newsletter, prepared talks/presentations, observing programs, and attendance at the ALCons. Through this Youth Committee, and its guidance from a coordinator, MSRAL officers will feel confident that there will be good stewards at the ready for the future.

ACT hosted the 5th convention in 1953 with Wichita Astronomical Society at Grand Lake of the Cherokees, at Grand Lake in Oklahoma. These two clubs would continue to partner for 8 conventions. The early version of Am-

ateur of the Year Award started at this convention.

Last but not least, is the Sugar Creek Astronomical Society who hosted in 2018 at Explore Scientific in Springdale, AR. It was at this meeting that MSRAL had a Horkheimer youth recipient named Abigail Bollenbach from the Bartlesville Astronomical Society who still is an astronomy influencer. No one from Sugar Creek Astronomical Society was present so the Regional Representative sent it to Past President, Kent Marts who gave it to the current President, Molly Ussery at their July meeting.

MSRAL's DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS

Another Regional grouping of awards were given to those who had spent many years volunteering in the Mid-Sates or at the National level or both.



Currently, the only service award MSRAL offers is the Amateur of the Year Award started in the early 50's. In light of the 75th celebration, and based on review of countless archives of National, MSRAL, and various regional club minutes, there were a few names that seemed to be in the limelight for over thirty years.

With a gap in MSRAL minutes from 1975 to 1992, the first recipient stepped in as a regional chair in 1994 to 1996, became Regional Vice Chair in 1999, Regional Chair in 2000 and Convention Chair in 2005, all the while serving as an executive officer either Vice President or President of the Astronomical League.

A Lifetime MSRAL Service Award and Certificate of Appreciation went to Past President, Carroll Iorg.

The second Lifetime MSRAL Service Award and Certificate of Appreciation went to a long standing member of the Astronomical Society of Kansas City. Starting in the 1990's Jackie Beucher served as National Executive Secre-



tary for several years, served as President of ASKC several times, became Regional Chair in 1992, and then served as MSRAL's Secretary-Treasurer for 7-years was replaced in 2019, so she could dedicate more time on National's Board of Trustees.

The main project that she worked on in the 90's that the Astronomical League is still a benefactor, was receiving all the data and information of the clubs and individual members from former Executive Secretary, Janet Stevens. All memberships were entered into the MS Access Data Base software which was the genesis of the current files used by Mitch Glaze today. Along with a few others, this team received the League's Service Award for all their hard work. Great Woman, Great Legacy.

2025 AstroCon Council Meeting Notes—Rick Heschmeyer

After quorum was determined Chuck announced a few new appointments. Dave Walden will chair a new convention planning committee, Willie Rainwater will be assisting with The Reflector as the new Ad Manager, and Denise Mose has been appointed as the new AL Historian.

Financial Report

Since Mike Coucke, the treasurer was not there, Chuck proceeded into the Financial Report. Overall financial health is good, in spite of the \$45K loss from the 2024 AlCon, which was offset by a temporary use of Trust Fund interest. The all-digital Reflector issue in March saw a \$25K savings instantly and a new publishing contract for the Reflector is projected to save an additional \$24K over the next 2 years. In addition, an unexpected additional \$75K from the Nye bequest was received.

Interest from the Trust Fund is estimated at \$40K.

Proposed budget for 25/26 was reviewed and approved.

League Sales update-Mitch Glaze and Mike Stoakes (contract services) will both be getting a 20% increase for 25/26 as will Judith Riley (AL employee)

Awards/GSP/AL Live Update

Terri Mann noted 55 nominations for Awards as well as updated the status of both the Global Star Parties and AL Live online events hosted by Explore Scientific.

Half of this year's Youth Award Winners were in attendance at the convention and a couple actually made presentations at the event.

New Items

Reviewed a proposal from Donald Lubowich to create an AL Award Program for "Music and Astronomy Under the Stars". It was decided that this kind of activity could be covered under the current outreach award program and the decision was to not proceed.

The Reflector

Discussed the changeover to Walsworth as the new publisher and again noted the savings the League will see. It was also mentioned that our old publisher came back to us with a counter offer, but the new contract with Walworth had already been signed.

Discussed adding Willie Rainwater as Ad Manager.

Also discussed that since the all-digital March issue several members have requested digital only going forward, which will add additional savings to the Reflector's bottom line.

Trust Fund Elections

Two open positions-Aaron Clevenson replacement needed for balance of term to avoid having 3 officers serving on the Trustee Board-Don Knabb elected.

Tim Hunter term expires 2025, new 4 year term. John Goss elected.

Continuing terms- Mike Coucke for the duration of his service as Treasurer, Terry Mann (expires 2026) Jim Fox (expires 2027)

PROPOSED CHANGES TO NATIONAL BYLAWS AND STANDING RESOLUTIONS 2025

Bylaws Committee- The vote on the 2024 Bylaws is still being tabulated and is expected to be reported by end of July/mid-August.

The following motions are made by Jim Fox as chair and on behalf of the Bylaws Revision Committee.

Additions are in green; deletions are in red, purposes are in brown. Bylaws changes must be approved by Council and then submitted to the membership for approval in the May 2026 ballot. If so approved, the Bylaws changes would become effective on September 1, 2026. Standing Resolutions must be approved by Council in open session at the national convention.

MOTION 1 PASSED

The committee moves that Council recommend to the membership an amendment to Article II, Officers, Section 8 (b) and (c), of the Bylaws to read:

- b. In the event of the death, resignation, removal, or disability of an executive officer other than the President, the President may appoint a successor to fill the unexpired term with the consent of a majority of the entire Executive Committee. Consent shall be given absent the assertion of disqualifying objections to the appointee (e.g. nepotism, lack of qualifications for the office, lack of eligibility for the office, and factors affecting the reputation of the League).
- c. If two or more executive offices other than the President must be filled under Section 5b of this Article, or if appointment of a single executive office cannot be resolved pursuant to paragraph b of this Section, the unfilled offices shall be filled by the full Council.

Purpose: This change prevents EC members from disapproving of officer appointments for purely personal or trivial reasons. It also provides a mechanism for appointing an officer if the Executive Committee is unable to resolve an appointment dispute.

MOTION 2 PASSED

The committee moves that Council recommend to the membership an amendment to Article VII, Committees, Section 4(a), of the Bylaws to read:

a. Members of Standing Committees may be appointed or removed by majority vote of Council or of the Executive Committee if Council is not in session unless other procedures are established in the Bylaws or Standing Resolutions that created the Standing Committees. Although League Regions are standing committees, Regional Chairs and Representatives who have been elected by members within their regions (i.e. not appointed) can only be removed in accordance with Missouri law.

Purpose: This motion clarifies that Regional Chairs and Representatives who have been elected by members in their regions (i.e. not appointed) can only be removed in accordance with Missouri law.

MOTION 3 PASSED

The committee moves that Council recommend to the membership an amendment to Article X, Property and Financial, Section 5, sentences 3 and 4, of the Bylaws to read as follows:

Authorized persons, however, may **not sign hotel or venue contracts or any single contracts in any** amount exceeding \$1,000, or multiple contracts exceeding \$2,000 in the aggregate relating to any single activity or event, without the prior approval of the President. Any authorized or non -authorized person violating any part of this section will **exceed** the scope of that person's authority and may be held liable for any losses incurred by the League.

Purpose: This change prevents any person from exposing the League to hotel or venue contract liability without the approval of the President.

MOTION 4 PASSED

The committee moves that Council recommend to the membership an amendment to Article XI, The Trust Fund, Section 2, to change subparts (2) and (3) of said Section to subparts (b) and (c). Purpose: This change corrects an outline format error.

MOTION 5 PASSED

The committee moves that Council recommend to the membership an amendment to Article XII, Amendments, Section 2, of the Bylaws to add the following sentence: A proposed amendment shall be distributed to each Member Society and to all other members who shall have the number of votes provided for in Article I, Section 3. **Council may include recommended action with the proposed amendment.**

Purpose: allows Council to endorse recommended Amendments that are submitted to the membership for approval.

MOTION 6

NOT PASSED (CURRENT WORDING MORE FLEXIBLE)

The Committee moves that Council amend Standing Resolution 3, Guidelines for Regional Assistance, as follows:

- 1. Whereas a modest source of income is **occasionally** necessary to enable regions to develop and conduct **special events** or programs, ...
- 2. Regions may request regional assistance once in any ten (10) year period subject to the limitations that (a) only one regional request will be granted in any one year and (b) Council deems that sufficient funds are available.
- 3. Regions must submit their requests to the Treasurer at least three (3) months before the annual Council meeting at which consideration is desired.
- 4-5. [Last two numbered paragraphs are unchanged and will be re-numbered.]

Purpose: This change limits regional assistance to one request in any ten (10) year period, and to one grant per year, if Council determines that sufficient funds are available.

MOTION 7 PASSED

The committee moves that Council amend Standing Resolution 5, The Astronomical League Award, paragraphs 3 and 8, as follows: **Amended 6/24/2025**, at Bryce Canyon National Park, UT.

3. Nominations must be made in writing to the League President.

Executive Secretary



- 6. The receipt of nomination shall be acknowledged by the **League President. Executive Secretary**. Nominations which are deemed to be qualified need not be acted upon in the year in which they are received but may be held for future consideration.
- 8. The committee may consider candidates of its own choosing. Nominate additional names.



Purpose: This change requires that award nominations go to the head of the AL Award Committee like the handling of Peltier Award nominations.

MOTION 8

POSTPONED TO ASTROCON 25

The committee moves that Council adopt a new Standing Resolution #21, Event Insurance, as follows:

Standing Resolution #21: Event Insurance Adopted by Council 6/24/2025, at Bryce Canyon National Park, UT.

- 1. Event insurance covering the League shall be obtained for (a) all conventions and star parties hosted, co-hosted, and/or conducted by the League and its regions, and (b) other events designated by the Executive Committee.
- 2. Event insurance called for in this Standing Resolution shall, if required, cover additional parties to include League member societies and host venues.

Purpose: This change requires that all conventions and significant events conducted by the League and its regions be covered by Event Insurance.
